

paraphrased from British author Alan Watts' telling of a Taoist parable, helps explain why.

Once there was a farmer whose horse ran away. That evening, all of his neighbours came around to commiserate. They said, "We are so sorry to hear your horse has run away. This is most unfortunate." The farmer said, "Maybe."

The next day, the horse came back, bringing seven wild horses. In the evening, everybody said, "Isn't that lucky. What a great turn of events. You now have eight horses!" The farmer again said, "Maybe."

The following day, his son tried to break one of the horses, and while riding it, he was thrown and broke his leg. The neighbours said, "Oh dear, that's too bad." The farmer responded, "Maybe."

The next day, officers came around to conscript people into the army, and they rejected his son because he had a broken leg. Again all the neighbours said, "Isn't that great!" Again, the farmer said, "Maybe."

What we learn from this is that nature is immensely complex. It's impossible to tell whether anything that happens is good or bad, because you never know what the consequences will be. All we can know is that with every action and reaction, there is an opportunity — a chance to live our values, express our desires, and take action to make the world a bit closer to the way we want it to be.

The Rotary Foundation is our conduit to make those meaningful changes. Through the Foundation, we do our part to help rid the world of

PROJECTS DURING THE MONTH OF JULY

We have provided a paddle Sink, Face Masks and Hand Sanitizers and Foot Bath Carpet to Dr. Thanninayagam Tamil Vidyalayam, a under privileged primary school in Borrella on the request of the Principal of the School.

There are about 150 primary student benefit out of the project and as you all aware ROTARY becoming the key initiative in STOP the SREAD in Sri Lanka.

The cost of the project was around Rs. 30,000/and contributed by the Rotary club members of Colombo South.







UPCOMING PROJECTS.....

1. Water and Sanitation Project at Mathugama with the budget of around Rs. 150,000/-.

Around 80 families living in Mathugama area, classified under very low-income category lack proper sanitation facilities. The need was identified by the priest of a local Church. The Rotary Club of Colombo South will help them build at least three toilets.

The project is funded by the members contribution and the project is chaired by PDG George.

The project will be handed over in the first week of September

This project will be used to cover multiple areas with more funding such as maternal health, literacy and education etc.

This will be **FAMILY OUTING DAY!** for RC Colombo South and have dates free during first week of SEPTEMBER.

2. Stop the Spread Project at Wellawatta Railway Station with a budget around Rs.65,000/-

After identifying the need to install the paddle sink in the Wellawatta Railway Station, Rotary Club as initiated to install about 5 paddle sink suitable to be used in the Railway Station.

As per the Station Master, Saman, there are about 10,000 passengers passes this Railway Station.

The project would cost around 65,000/-. The project will be funded by members of the Rotary Club Colombo South.

This project will also be used as a ROTARY Branding tool to make awareness among public to stop the VIRUS spread in the Country.
